


FRONT GARDEN WINNERS


RATBY BAND TRIUMPH

100 Mile Canoe Test

How it all began for me and Ratby - by Ray Lander

Over the past thirty-odd years I have been lucky enough to canoe along the river Temes, Avon, Severn, Trent, Wye, Nene, Welland, Soar and Sence - not to mention canoe sea surfing which is great fun! It all started back in 1962 with the 91st Leicester Scout Group after being with the group as a leader for six years. I decided to take a break from scouting and became a member of the Leicester Canoe Club based at the Old Aylestone Boat House.

After being away from scouting for about six vears, the East District Commissioner visited me to ask if I would consider returning again and if so. he would introduce me to the 95th Leicester Scout Group to get them motivated as they didn't do a lot!

After thinking about it for a couple of weeks I agreed, and three months later I said that with the scouts help I would be willing to build some fibreglass canoes as I had learnt how to do this with the Leicester Canoe Club. We built six canoes and I started teaching the scouts how to The first 100 mile canoe test we entered was in 1977 - the Queens Jubilee Year! Whilst everyone

canoe was celebrating and partying in the streets, myself, five scouts and another scout leader joined up with the Liecester Boys Clubs to slog it out down the River Wye. We started at Glasbury Bridge and finished at Tintern Abbey and this was the start of an annual event for the scouts

I left the 95th Leicester Scout Group when I came to live in Groby in 1980. A work colleague of mine, John Evans, ran the Ellistown Youth Club and he asked if I would teach him and his group how to canoe. He had the use of the swimming pool and canoes at Ibstock College. I agreed to take them on and a few weeks later the sports master at the college asked me if I would like to start a canoe club as he had some canoes which had been in storage for years. This was the start of Ibstock Ellistown Canoe Club and every year we entered the 100 mile canoe test.


The headmistress at Ellistown Primary School heard that an ex-scout leader was teaching canoeing and asked John Evans to set up a meeting to ask if I would start a scout group in Ellistown. On the 22nd August 1981 the Ellistown

Scout Group was registered and I became the Group Scout Leader - but that's another story!

Being good friends with Joe Williams at the Quorn Hall Outdoor Pursuits centre, he offered me six old canoes on permanent loan for the scouts to use. decided to resign as chairman of the canoe club to concentrate on the scout group work.


In 1989 I moved from Ellistown Scout Group to the 1st Ratby Scout Group and introduced them to canoeing. Every year in April, training commenced for anyone wanting to take part in the 100 mile canoe test and one night a week we would go for a paddle on the river for five to ten miles without a break (I was a hard task master!). On Saturdays we would go for a day's river trip, it must have paid off because I never had anyone drop out of the 100 mile canoe test (unlike many other groups!).

Three years ago, at the age of 66, I gave up teaching canoeing because David Payne and Matthew Flower had gained their canoeing scout charge certificates and I knew that the scouts would be in capable hands. I am sure they will carry on the good work and they are now B.C.U. Qualified Canoeing Instructors, along with Yousaf Mirza. With their keenness and a constant flow of willing paddlers I am sure that the tradition will continue for many years to come.





Those of us who are amateur gardeners and not blessed with green fingers might have been green with envy at the colourful slides presented by Mr Peter Barton, from Cropston, showing 'Gardens Great and Small'. A large selection ranged from such enormous showpieces as Hampton Court and Wisley to some extremely ambitious, but beautiful, family dwelling house gardens of more modest proportions. Although this was not a talk on gardening, per se, it did give insight into what can be done with the most humble plot and also encouragement to those local gardeners who aspire to making their own patch a cut above the ordinary. Mr Barton's photography enhanced a relaxing May evening's enjoyment.

The June meeting was not quite so relaxing but nevertheless just as enjoyable when a party of twenty five members was met by Dr Helen Boynton, and her patient dog, at Bradgate Park where she gave a conducted tour and fascinating talk on the fossils contained in the 550 million year old rocks as well as pointing out the patterns made in the sedimentary layers by volcanic movement under the sea. Yes, Old John was once submerged and the volcanoes which deposited the ash and lava to form the well known rocks were at Whitwick and Bardon Hill. It is surprising that the first fossil was not spotted until 1963 since when fifty different types have been discovered, none of which can be identified relative to anything previously known. In fact so unique are these fossils that interested parties from as far away as Russia and America have been to Bradgate, accompanied by Dr Boynton, to view these amazing pre-historic phenomena.

After an hour and a half walking and climbing we came away very much wiser if a little bit wearier than when we arrived.



The Leicestershire County Council Trading Standards Service is warning the public and businesses to be on their guard against some companies offering lucrative opportunities in the film industry.

In the past, complaints have been received from people who have paid agencies to 'register' them as film extras, only to be disappointed when no such work materialises.

In a new development, traders in the service industries builders, taxi drivers, caterers, interior designers - are being approached in this and other areas. They are put on a register and promised the opportunity of work in the film industry at high rates - up to £700 per day - for their services. Firstly, however, they are asked to pay a large fee in advance.

Beef Lasagne

Ingredients

8 oz good quality minced beef 1 or 2 rashers of bacon 1 clove garlic crushed (optional) 1 onion peeled and chopped 1 carrot peeled and grated 2 or 3 mushrooms chopped 2 tablespoons tomato puree or 1 small tin of tomatoes ¹/₂ pint beef stock or ¹/₄ stock & ¹/₄ white wine 1 teaspoon mixed herbs Salt and pepper

Cheese Sauce

1 oz (25gr) butter or margarine 1 oz (25gr) flour 1 teaspoon mustard ¹/₂ pint milk Salt and pepper 4 oz (100gr) tasty cheese grated

3 oz (75gr) or 3 or 4 sheets of precooked lasagne 2 pint oblong ovenproof dish

Method

- Fry chopped bacon for 5 mins, add onion, carrot, garlic and mushrooms for further 5 mins
- 2. Add beef, stir until separate and brown
- 3. Stir in tomatoes, stock, herbs and seasoning, bring to the boil and simmer for 30 mins to reduce
- 4. Cheese sauce melt fat,off heat stir in flour and seasoning, cook over very low heat, gradually stir in milk, stir well until smooth and well cooked. Beat in cheese, saving a little to sprinkle on top
- 5. Put one third of lasagne in dish, cover with one third of meat and liquid then scant third of cheese sauce, repeat ending with generous amount of cheese sauce, sprinkle remaining cheese on top and cook in oven at gas mark 5 or electric 190°c or 375°f for 30 - 35 mins
