

# Rathy Village Society

David Grimshaw, from Earl Shilton, is so enthusiastic about collecting and repairing clocks that he initiated the Old Clock Club for like minded individuals. The passionate love of his hobby was well demonstrated by his lively and amusing commentary on his selection of slides which he presented at the September meeting. Although it was entitled 'Antique Clocks' it also embraced some as late as the 1950s for the simple reason that plastic clock cases, which because they were cheap and undistinguished looking, were soon discarded and those surviving are now valuable collector's items! Many and various are the materials which were used in the past for their manufacture from wood, porcelain and metal even gold! The designs are innumerable from the elegant to the bizarre and his favourites are the wooden cased Black Forest clocks, ornately carved, usually with animal motifs and including the cuckoo clocks. Even if one has no interest in the aesthetics of the domestic clock, but merely for its use as a timepiece, the fascinating spectrum of the clock- makers art was enough to remind one how soulless and mundane are the modern digital creations.

Another enthusiast, but this time for the brilliant portrayal on slides of flowers, is Mr Peter Barton of Cropston. His subject at the October meeting was 'Herbs Ancient and Modern', an extremely wide field embracing the culinary, aromatic and medical varieties of well known, and the more obscure, cultivated, and wild plants which can be put to good use rather than exist just for ornamentation. There were some surprising inclusions, a few of which are often thought of as weeds, which have most useful properties given the right knowledge of the subject.

If one were rash enough to believe, in total, the writings of the 17th Century herbalist, Culpepper, there is no known ailment under the sun, and a few more besides, which cannot be cured by employing the right recipe concocted from the appropriate plants - from dandelions to sunflowers! The one which stretched incredulity beyond all limits were certain berries which if rubbed on the neck would be guaranteed to deter unwanted guests from outstaying their welcome.

One wonders whether it might work on double-glazing salesmen?

### **OH CHRISTMAS TREE**

When Queen Victoria and Prince Albert decorated a tree at Windsor in 1841 they started a new fashion. It was a revival of the ancient tradition of bringing greenery into the home. As far back as the Iron Age trees were 'dressed' and evergreens decorated for The Winter Solstice.

The Norway Spruce is the traditional festive tree, its needles lingering in carpets until almost the next winter. In his fascinating guide, 'Flora Britannica', Richard Mabey includes a greeting from a London industrial cleaning firm. The rhyme was printed on a Hoover bag:

On the Trail of the Lonesome Pine Needle


You'll find them in the budgie's cage, and in the baby's cot. You can afford to leave no stone Unturned, no tender foot unsocked.

It's mid-July, you call out, "Waiter, what's this in my soup?". He replies "Norwegian Tarragon according to the cook".

Nowadays there are a range of strategies for preventing this problem, sprays to fix the needles, new varieties of evergreen trees which retain their needles longer, and of course, artificial trees.

In these days of environmental concerns, it could be argued that artificial trees, stored in the loft for

years, are more environmentally friendly. But is there a case for the real tree? There may be a benefit in planting the trees, and growing them for several years before cutting. Afterwards they are sometimes planted in the garden, or shredded to make mulch. What are the processes involved in manufacturing artificial trees, and what happens to them when they are discarded in landfill sites? Perhaps there are environmentalists in the village who can enlighten



That other Christmassy tree, the holly, is a native of our hedgerows, unlike the commercially planted Norway Spruce in Martinshaw Wood.

In ancient times holly was a fertility symbol, and a charm against witches. It was brought into the house at the winter solstice, with ivy and mistletoe, and usually taken down on twelfth night. In some parts of the country it was left hanging indoors until Shrove Tuesday, when it was used to make the fire for cooking pancakes.

In the Christian Church the prickly holly leaves came to represent Christ's crown of thorns, and the berries his blood.


### The Mistletoe Bough

Holly, ivy, and mistletoe were the traditional plants for kissing boughs and wreaths. Kissing under the mistletoe is probably the most widely practised of the ancient traditions, even when the plant is a plastic imitation. To our ancestors, this parasitic plant seemed magical, able to survive with no roots. It was believed to have amazing powers.

Although mistletoe grows on a wider variety of trees than was formerly believed, the loss of traditional orchards in recent years has deprived the plant of one of its favourite hosts, the apple tree. Much of the mistletoe on sale in our markets today is imported from Normandy and Picardy.

Perhaps when the Ratby Community Orchard is established we may have our own home-grown

mistletoe?






22 reported crimes over a 57 day period!

### TURKISH DELIGHT

INGREDIENTS 1 LBS (454 G) GRANULATED SUGAR 1 Oz (28 g) GELATINE 1/2 PINT (10 FLUID OZS) COLD WATER 2 TEASPOONS ORANGE FLOWER WATER +2 TEASPOONS CORNFLOUR - BLENDED WITH 2 OR 3 TEASPOONS COLD WATER

### **METHOD**

- FILL 7" SQUARE TIN WITH COLD WATER
- PUT1/2 PINT COLD WATER INTO LARGE SAUCEPAN SPRINKLE GELATINE ON AND LEAVE TO SOAK
- PUT OVER VERY LOW HEAT TO DISSOLVE
- ADD SUGAR STIR UNTIL DISSOLVED
- BRING TO THE BOIL -- BOIL FOR 6 MINUTES STIRRING OCCASIONALLY
- REMOVE FROM HEAT STIR IN BLENDED CORNFLOUR. REBOIL FOR 1 MIN. REMOVE FROM HEAT
- ADD VERY LITTLE AMOUNT OF COLOURING PALE PINK
- EMPTY COLD WATER FROM TIN & POUR MIXTURE IN
- WHEN QUITE SET, CUT INTO SQUARES & TOSS IN MIXTURE OF ICING SUGAR & CORNFLOUR
- LEAVE FOR 2 DAYS TO THOROUGHLY DRY.
